Semester 2 staffing

There will be a few staffing changes at Kingston Community School for Term 3 with a few staff shuffling around to cover leave of leaders. We have also split the Year 7 class for Maths, English and HASS. They have become a larger group with new enrolments and we want to support their learning by creating smaller groups not just for the practical subjects but for the key curriculum subjects.

Jim Crawford Award

Our Library has been awarded the presitgious Jim Crawford Award for Innovation in Libraries. This award celebrates innovative and inspiring services and projects being delivered through South Australia's public libraries.

It is a \$10,000 bursary which can be used for further improvements to a Library. Our Library was selected for the 'Literacy Without Barriers: building a community of readers' project, through which staff have developed educational book packs to support preschool and early years families to build core early literacy skills. We are exceptionally proud to be the first school/community library to win this award.

New Technical College for the Limestone Coast

A new Technical College is set to open in Mt Gambier in 2026 on the grounds of the current tafe SA site. Students in Year 10-12 will be able to access part time training through the new facility, growing their skills and knowledge in careers based around the following four industries:

- Agri Tech
- Early Childhood and Education
- Health
- Multi Trades

The facility will include accommodation and state of the art technology to support the skills required for the careers involved. More information about this facility, dates of opening days and enrolment details will be released in 2025.

Home study/Lunch passes

Year 12's have had permission sent home to extend their home study now that Research Project is completed. At KCS home study is offered to Year 12 students only and the expectation is that these students are either at school or at home studying during school hours.

Department for Education

Year 11 students are not eligible for home study and if they are not at school they should be listed as family, ill and/or unexplained.

Lunch passes are offered to students in Year 6 and up with permission from families. The expectation with lunch passes is that students are going home for lunch and not down the street unsupervised or to another friend's house. Students who sign out with a lunch pass need to return to school for afternoon lessons. Students who continue to not meet the expectations of home study and/or lunch passes may have these passes revoked after the school has been in touch with the family to discuss their concerns.

The Lions Mad Minute is a project led by the Mount Gambier Lions Club, offering an impromptu public speaking competition for Year 5 students. This year, the competition involved 35 schools and more than 1,000 students across 55 classrooms in the Limestone Coast region.

On June 26th, Annika Trott and Alex Starega, winners of the KCS Mad Minute competition, took part in the Upper Limestone Coast Grand Challenge Final held in Lucindale. The event featured 45 participants from 17 different schools, each delivering speeches on a randomly selected topic before a large audience and three judges.

Congratulations to both Annika and Alex who displayed confidence and creativity in their speeches, engaging the audience with their well-organized thoughts and ideas.

Visiting Author/Illustrator

Our Year 3-6 classes were fortunate to participate in an engaging drawing workshop with visiting Australian children's author and illustrator Paul Rutter.




Teenagers and Safety Survey - Commissioner for Children and Young People in SA

The Commissioner for Children and Young People's job is to promote the rights and wellbeing of all children and young people in South Australia.

The Safety Survey is designed for young people aged 13 to 19 years old living in

South Australia to share their thoughts about safety.



The responses from the survey will be used to inform the Commissioner's submission to the Royal Commission into Domestic, Family, and Sexual Violence in South Australia. The Royal Commission is interested in understanding the perspectives of young people.

Survey responses may also be used in the Commissioner's other advocacy work and may be shared with a range of people, including politicians, decision makers, researchers, and the wider public. Privacy is important and young people will not be asked for any information that could be used to identify them.

If this survey brings up any issues or concerns for young people, support is available.

Our site will participate in this survey in Week 10 and students will be asked to complete it during a morning home group session (survey is only 10 minutes long). Please advise the school before Monday 1st July on 87672677 if you would prefer your child/ren not participate.

PPEP Talk

Last Thursday the Pelvic Pain Foundation delivered their PPEP Talk to our Year 10s on period pain, pelvic pain, and endometriosis. The program is delivered with both state and federal funding and serves to educate students on what is normal and what is not, or what potentially requires more investigation or medical intervention.

The clinical educator took students through the anatomy, the processes at play, different types of pain, where pain is perceived, what to do to have pain investigated, and different exercises and products on the market to support with comfort and pain management. There was also a strong focus on understanding pelvic pain and what to do to help support those we care about going through it.

For families of students who attended the session, a flyer is attached here to indicate next steps to follow if you and your child would like to further investigate pelvic pain via a webinar in a more personalised way with pelvic pain specialist Dr Susan Evans. Our students were highly engaged, enjoyed the personable and 'hands on' nature of the presentation, and the ability to ask questions in a safe and supportive space. PPEP Talk will visit again to speak to next year's Year 10s in 2025.

The new School Mental Health Service has arrived

We are pleased to announce that the Department for Education is implementing a school-based mental health service for students at Kingston Community School. This service started in Term 4, 2023 and adds extra mental health supports to our school.

School Mental Health Practitioners will provide an early intervention mental health service, supporting students with emerging and mild-moderate mental health concerns. The service will be flexible depending on the needs of our students.

How does the new service help?

Practitioners may provide a range of services, including:

- · assessing student mental health needs and concerns
- supporting students to develop strategies to manage distress and maintain their mental health
- contributing to referral and case management processes for students with more complex mental health presentations
- supporting referrals and linking to external support services as required
- developing the mental health literacy of their school communities.

Practitioners have formal training in psychology, social work and/or occupational therapy and experience working in mental health related settings. They work collaboratively with students and families, education staff, other support service providers and external agencies to support young people to improve their psychological health and emotional wellbeing.
